Minutes from the General Meeting Wednesday, November 19, 2025

The meeting was called to order at 6:30 pm by Jean Anne Branch for the monthly meeting. Jean Anne opened the meeting by reading a quote from Anna Aquino: "In your life, the people become like a patchwork quilt." It was very interesting to hear how different people in your life can relate to different types of blocks, including ones like ones that are bigger or smaller than you like or the one like the comfortable old piece of flannel.

She noted we're going to do the program first tonight to allow Kay Courson to leave early as she has a long drive home.

Program: Cathy Carlson told us about the Panel Play that we brought our panel and fabric for. The brown bags we turned in will be distributed at the end of the meeting. We are to make a project for the person whose bag we received and create a project with the panel and the fabric.

Helen Short introduced Kay Courson who is the owner of Country Thyme Quilting in Troy, VT. Kay will be doing a presentation on Panel Play and brought many quilts and other projects to show us how many different ways a panel can be used. She also brought many panels, patterns, and books to help with our Panel Play projects. There were so many really different ideas such as cutting out key items in the panel and appliquéing them to a quilt, doing a window pane of the panel, placemats, stocking, etc...so many ideas. Many thanks to Kay!

We were given a few moments to look through all of her fabulous panels and patterns to purchase.

At 7:10 pm, Jean Ann called the meeting back to order. Before getting into the meeting, Jean Anne requested a volunteer for the Sunshine Department to send cards to members in need. John Rouleau volunteered. Thank you, John!

Consent Agenda: A motion was made by Helen Short and seconded by Joan Wood to accept the October 17, 2025 Secretary report and November Treasurer report. One change will be made in the Treasures report to correct a typo. All in favor, motion carried.

By-Laws Update: Jean Anne stated it was now time to vote on the By-Laws and Rules that we discussed last month.

- <u>By-Laws Motion</u>: Laurel Schapp made a motion that we approve the updated By-Laws, and it was seconded by Peggy Paradee. All in favor, motion carried.
- <u>Standing Rules Motion</u>: Denise Chase made a motion that we approve the Rules; this was seconded by Beth Brault. All in favor, motion carried.

Thanks to Jean Anne, Sandy Lane and Sharon Perry for their work updating the by-laws and creating the standing rules.

Quilt Show (Beth Mouser/Diane Kane):

• Diane Kane is working on vendors. She said we have one new vendor and other returning ones. She is working with getting Quilts of Valor back and hopefully will have some presentations while they are at the show.

- Joan Wood is working with sponsor donations. So far there are 10 donors for a total of \$1,550.
- Beth Mouser reminded us about the Challenge Quilt for this year's quilt show. It is Celebrating America. She suggested some places to get inspiration such as the American Revolution series on PBS, YouTube videos, fabric stores that are getting fabrics celebrating the 250th anniversary of the United States of America. The quilt size limit is 100" around
- Peggy Paradee let us know the status of the volunteer signup sheet. She said that there were 30 open spots and she had started circulating the sheet. We must sign up by the December meeting since there will be no meetings in January and February. She still has two open spots for demos. We have a lot of talent in the group so we should be able to fill those spots.
- Calling all pet photos! If you have a pet that "helps" with your quilting, bring in a photo. Mary is going to make a collage of these to be displayed in the lobby at the quilt show.
- There will be a scavenger hunt for younger people. Let Penny know if you have something unique on the quilts you are submitting so it can be added to the scavenger list. There will be about 10 items on the list and the children will get a page of stickers when they are done.

<u>Vermont Quilt Show, June 2026 (Denise Chase, Sharon Perry, Helen Short)</u>:

- There are still 30 openings for quilts for the June quilt show.
- The organizers of the VT Quilt Show in June will be looking for volunteers to work the show.

<u>Comfort Quilts (Denise Chase)</u>: Denise noted that there were more baby quilt kits for quilters to take and also larger kits. There are two pillows that need to be covered for the Guild Boutique.

Programs (Helen Short, Cathy Carlson):

- As part of tonight's program, we are exchanging the brown bags we brought filled with a panel and some yardage of coordinating fabric. The project you make will be due back in November 2026 with a completed project.
- December's meeting is our annual potluck and gift exchange meeting. Please bring a dish to share and a gift with a value of no more than \$15 if you would like to participate in the gift exchange. Please also bring canned goods.

Membership (Penny LaRochelle): Penny announced 66 paid members, 4 Lifetime members (25 consecutive years of membership): Denise Chase; Bonnie Evans; Dale McFeeters; and Carol Stanley. Present at meeting: 48

Block of the Month (BOM) (Sandy Lane):

- Sandy presented a sample of the December Block of the Month which is a Sawtooth Star pattern. The block should be made with red, white and blue fabrics which can be organized in the block in any way that you choose.
- Instructions will be posted on the FCQG under "Projects." Sandy demonstrated how the block will be assembled.
- Members are encouraged to bring completed blocks to the December meeting.
- October BOM: There were 28 blocks that are fairly large so Sandy drew two names. Winners: Sarah Reed and Deb Trahan.

RECIPE CORNER

EGGNOG FUDGE

½ cup butter

3/4 cup eggnog

2 cups white sugar

2 cups white chocolate chips

1 7-oz jar marshmallow crème

2 teaspoons vanilla extract

½ teaspoon grated nutmeg

Line a 9x9 pan with foil. Spray with non-stick cooking spray.

In a medium sauce pan, combine butter, sugar, and eggnog. Bring to a boil. Cook until the temperature reaches 234 degrees on a candy thermometer.

Remove from heat. Stir in white chocolate until melted. Stir in marshmallow crème, vanilla, and nutmeg.

Evenly spread into prepared pan. Garnish with more grated nutmeg if desired.

EGGNOG SNICKERDOODLES

For the cookie dough:

½ cup butter, softened

1 cup sugar

1 egg

1 teaspoon rum extract

½ cup eggnog

2³/₄ cups all-purpose flour

½ teaspoon salt

½ teaspoon baking soda

½ teaspoon nutmeg

For sugar mixture for rolling:

½ cup sugar

2 tablespoons cinnamon

½ teaspoon nutmeg

For the icing:

3/4 cup powdered sugar

1-2 tablespoons eggnog

For the cookie dough:

Preheat the oven to 350°F. Line two large baking sheets with parchment or spray with cooking spray.

In a large bowl or the bowl of a stand mixer, beat butter and 1 cup sugar, until light and fluffy. Add the egg, rum extract, and eggnog, and mix to combine. Add the flour, salt, baking soda, and nutmeg, and mix until a soft dough forms.

In a small bowl, whisk the ½ cup sugar, cinnamon, and nutmeg. Scoop the dough into one-inch balls and

roll in the sugar mixture. Place on the prepared baking sheets.

Bake for 10-12 minutes, or until lightly browned on the bottom. Let cool on the pan for 5 minutes, then move to a cooling rack.

For the icing:

While the cookies are cooling, whisk the powdered sugar and enough eggnog to make an icing that is easy to drizzle but not too runny. Pipe snowflakes onto the cooled cookies, or drizzle with the icing.

Recipe Notes: If the dough is sticky to work with, simply chill it in the fridge for 30 minutes.

This recipe makes a puffy snickerdoodle. If you wish, you can gently press down the cookie dough balls before baking them for a flatter cookie.

Cover and store the dough from this snickerdoodle recipe in the fridge for 1-2 days.

Store baked cookies in an airtight container at room temperature for 3-4 days. Store in a freezer bag, or airtight container in the freezer for up to 4 months.

EGGNOG DIP

8 oz cream cheese room temperature

1 teaspoon vanilla extract

½ teaspoon rum extract

½ teaspoon cinnamon

½ teaspoon nutmeg

½ cup eggnog room temperature

2 cups powdered sugar

Beat the soft cream cheese until smooth and light and fluffy. Mix in the vanilla extract, rum extract, cinnamon, and nutmeg.

Beat in the eggnog, and then the powdered sugar.

Store in an airtight container in the refrigerator until ready to serve. Serve with graham crackers or ginger snap cookies.
